The Valley of the Moon Music Festival
Announces its 11th Season
July 12-27, 2025

SONOMA, CA., March 31, 2025—The Valley of the Moon Music Festival (VMMF) returns for its highly anticipated 11th season, presenting an exhilarating lineup of concerts exploring the power of personal and artistic relationships. Led by Artistic Directors Tanya Tomkins and Eric Zivian, this year's Festival, titled *Liaisons*, delves into the intricate connections between composers, genres, and eras.

Nestled in the heart of Sonoma's Wine Country, VMMF has spent over a decade bringing chamber music to life on historical instruments, offering audiences a rare opportunity to hear gems of the chamber music repertoire as the composers intended them.



The 2025 season examines the bonds that inspired creativity—from lifelong friendships and sibling rivalries to artistic mentorships and stylistic revolutions. This year's repertoire spans centuries and continents, from Bach to Scott Joplin, revealing the inspirations and collaborations that have defined classical music.

"For our 11th season, we wanted to highlight the relationships that are crucial to music history," said Tomkins and Zivian. "This season, we celebrate these dynamic and often complicated liaisons, brought to life by extraordinary musicians in beautiful Sonoma."

2025 Season Highlights

- 10 chamber music concerts over 3 weekends in July featuring an intergenerational roster of musicians, including Artistic Directors Tanya Tomkins and Eric Zivian.
- Complimentary wine receptions following each Hanna Center Auditorium performance, offering audiences the chance to meet the artists.
- The pre-concert Blattner Lecture Series, with dynamic speakers and experts in the field hosted by renowned musicologist Kate van Orden.
- Debut performances by the 2025 Apprentices and Fellowship Quartet—your opportunity to hear the preeminent artists of the future, today.
- A pay-what-you-choose concert at La Luz Center, featuring works by Latin American composers and Beneath a Tree.
- A free Kids & Family Concert with Grammy Award-winning jazz violinist Mads Tolling and the 2025 Apprentice Quartet.

The Festival opens Saturday, July 12 with Fanny and Felix Mendelssohn: A Musical Family, a poignant portrait of the deep bond between siblings Fanny Hensel and Felix Mendelssohn. The program features renowned violinists Owen Dalby (St. Lawrence String Quartet) and Jennifer Frautschi, Festival favorites Elizabeth Blumenstock and Ramón Carreño Martinez on viola, and Aaron Wolff (in his Festival debut) and VMMF Artistic DirectorTanya Tomkins on cello. The program includes Mendelssohn's luminous String Quintet in A major and Hensel's show-stopping Piano Trio, alongside pieces by J.S. Bach, a composer who inspired them both..

On **Sunday**, **July 13**, join us for an intriguing look at the tumultuous relationship between Richard Wagner and the French Romantics (**Wagner and the French: A Love-Hate Relationship**). Initially, French composers such as Debussy and Chausson were captivated by Wagner's groundbreaking innovations, eagerly embracing his music as model and inspiration—but after the Franco-Prussian War, a surge of patriotic fervor engendered a movement toward a distinctly French musical identity. This shift coincided with a broader rebellion against Romanticism itself, pushing the French toward a new musical language that anticipated modernism.

Featuring guitarist Marc Teicholz, violist Ramón Carrero-Martinez, and baroque to folk ensemble Beneath a Tree, among others, the season's first **Alfresco Concert** (**Thursday**, **July 17**) will be held on the beautiful patio of the La Luz Center. Bask in the evening's lingering warmth as you enjoy appetizers, wine, and music by Spanish-speaking composers from Baroque to Classical and beyond, accompanied by comments from the stage in both Spanish and English.

Be transported to Paris with us on **Saturday**, **July 19**, as we enter the world of legendary pedagogue **Nadia Boulanger**: **20th Century Influencer**. Many young talents sought the guidance of the Grande Dame of 20th century composition, among them Astor Piazzolla, Aaron Copland, and Quincy Jones—whose works you will hear, alongside works by Stravinsky (whom she advised and admired), her sister Lili Boulanger, and the G minor Piano Quartet of her own teacher, Gabriel Fauré.

Sunday, July 20: Clara Schumann and Her Circle. In addition to being the wife of renowned composer Robert Schumann and raising their many children, Clara Schumann was one of 19th-century Europe's foremost pianists who maintained a grueling touring schedule—yet she still found time to compose. Two composers featured on this program were part of Clara's circle: Josephine Lang, for whom Clara organized a benefit concert after her husband's untimely death, and Swedish composer and violinist Amanda Maier, whom Clara befriended in her later years. According to Maier's great-granddaughter, Saskia Thiadens (who lives in Napa!), a long-lost score of Maier's was discovered in a

family member's attic! Although her music is rarely heard today, we are thrilled to share her brilliance alongside works by the Schumanns, Josephine Lang, and Johannes Brahms.

On **Tuesday**, **July 22**, prepare for an evening of musical fireworks at the second **Alfresco Concert** of the summer, set against the picturesque backdrop of Buena Vista Winery's charming courtyard. Arrive early to savor the beauty of the surroundings while enjoying a glass of Buena Vista wine and a leisurely picnic. The performance will begin with a delightful cello and guitar duo, featuring Angela Lee and Marc Teicholz. The night will culminate with one of the most exhilarating works of the entire chamber music repertoire—Felix Mendelssohn's Octet, composed, incredibly, when he was only 16. This vibrant masterpiece will be brought to life by the festival's Apprenticeship and Fellowship quartets, with Laureate violinist Juliette Greer at the helm.

Our third weekend of concerts begins **Friday**, **July 25** with **The VMMF Apprentice Concert**. Whether pursuing undergraduate or graduate degrees, or already well into their professional careers, our apprentices are accomplished artists who share extraordinary promise and an eagerness to expand their horizons and hone their interpretive skills. They are mentored by world-class faculty while performing on historically accurate instruments.

Paris has long been a city that absorbs influences from across the globe, a vibrant hub where cutting-edge musical ideas flourish. On **Saturday**, **July 26**, **Americans in Paris** celebrates the rich musical exchange between two continents: the composers featured in this concert were either Americans who were beloved in Paris and adopted French harmonies, or, like Debussy and Ravel, were deeply influenced by the vibrant music of the Americas and embraced the rhythmic freedom of jazz with open arms. VMMF Fellow Julia Yang (cello) makes her Festival debut in this concert, alongside a returning favorite, violinist Rachell Ellen Wong.

Kids and Family Concert: on Sunday, July 27, bring family and friends of all ages—from 2 to 102—to the outdoor patio of the Sonoma Community Center for a fun, engaging, and educational hour featuring music from many different musical traditions. Featuring Grammy Award-winning jazz violinist Mads Tolling in his Festival debut, alongside the 2025 Apprenticeship Quartet, this concert promises to delight audiences with its energy and artistry. It's FREE for the entire community—don't miss it!

Also on **Sunday**, **July 27**, the Festival concludes with a flourish, in a concert aptly titled **Inspirations**. Music is passed down through generations, with each composer responding to those who preceded them—whether striving to match or surpass their predecessors' achievements, or simply to honor and incorporate their voices. This concert tells the story of one such set of musical dialogues. Hear Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings, featuring

our full complement of players—faculty, Apprentices, Fellows, and Laureates—led by violinist Rachell Ellen Wong. Tchaikovsky was deeply inspired by Mozart, who in turn was profoundly influenced by Haydn—and so, before the Serenade, you will hear a Piano Trio by Mozart, as well as Haydn's ebullient string quartet op. 33, no. 5.

In addition to our concerts, renowned Harvard professor and musician Kate van Orden returns to VMMF as host of the *Blattner Lecture Series*. <u>Each Saturday at 2:30 pm</u> before the 4 pm concert, Kate will introduce a guest expert in musicology or music history, who will offer essential insights to deepen your concertgoing experience and take questions from the audience. These lectures are free to anyone who purchases a ticket to the afternoon concert. We heartily encourage you to take this opportunity to enrich your understanding of the music you'll hear!

A pay-what-you-choose concert celebrating the rich traditions of Spanish-speaking composers, ensuring accessibility for all music lovers at La Luz Center's charming outdoor patio.

June 22 | Benefit Concert at the Moon House Antiquarium

An exclusive evening of chamber music in the mystical setting of the Moon House Antiquarium, featuring performances by VMMF Apprentices and Fellows in support of the VMMF's mission and education programs.
